

RESOLUTION

PRE/1001/2007, of 3rd April, making public the agreement reached between the Management Board of the Ramon Margalef Prize in Ecology and Environmental Sciences on 2nd April 2007 by which the call for the second award of the Prize is opened and the rules for participation established.

Whereas Decree 464/2004 of 28 December created the Ramon Margalef Prize in Ecology and Environmental Sciences,

Whereas the agreement of the Prize Management Board, adopted in session on 30 November 2005, resolved to open the call for the second award of the Prize and established the rules for participation,

Whereas Article 9.1 of Decree 464/2004 of 28 December provided that the call for the Prize must be published in the Official Bulletin of the Generalitat of Catalonia (DOGC),

I resolve:

AGREEMENT

of 2nd April 2007 of the Management Board of the Ramon Margalef Prize in Ecology and Environmental Sciences by which the call is opened for the third award of the Prize and the rules for participation established.

In accordance with Decree 464/2004 of 28 December by which the Ramon Margalef Prize in Ecology and Environmental Sciences was created and in exercise of the functions provided in Article 6.1 of the aforementioned Decree, the Management

Board agrees:

To open the call for the third award of the Ramon Margalef Prize in Ecology and Environmental Sciences and establish the rules for participation therein, which appear in the Appendix.

APPENDIX

In the Ramon Margalef Prize in Ecology and Environmental Sciences 2007 Call

During the second half of the 20th century, ecology evolved as a distinct science. In the last quarter of the century, the leading principles and concepts of this science led to the development of many technical and scientific skills relevant to the management of natural resources and land use, and at the same time have contributed to revealing new approaches to socio-economic knowledge. This relative historical proximity explains why awards in environmental sciences and especially in ecology continue to be scarce.

One of the leading scholars and thinkers in the ecological sciences was Professor Ramon Margalef i Lopez (Barcelona, 1919-2004), a figure who made an intellectual contribution of the highest order. In an extremely unfavourable socio-economic context, in post-war Spain and under the Franco regime, Margalef was able to place ecological research and thinking in Catalonia at the highest international level and thus create a true school of thought. In fact, the personality of Ramon Margalef contributed decisively to the development of modern ecological science to the point of his being considered one of the most respected figures in the scientific world, to a large extent thanks to having been able to interpret natural systems in terms of information theory. With this in mind, the Ramon Margalef Prize in Ecology and Environmental Sciences was instituted to honour the memory of a modest genius who, to the end of his days, was at the cutting edge of science.

1. Aim

The main aim of the Prize is to recognise an exceptional scientific career or a discovery in the field of ecology or other environmental science that has contributed to significant progress in scientific knowledge and thought or to the development of theoretical approaches for the sound management of natural resources, or use of the land and sea.

2. Candidatures

The Prize may be awarded to living individuals (the Prize is not awarded posthumously), or to legal entities or groups from anywhere in the world that, through their scientific career and teaching, their thinking, creativity, innovation and discoveries have contributed to the significant development of ecology or other environmental science, as well as to conceptual advancement and its application aimed at the sustainable management of natural resources, or use of the land and sea.

3. Presentation of candidatures

The candidatures must be presented by competent qualified representatives of universities, other schools, research centres, academies of science or their scientific subsidiaries, or by persons who have been awarded the Prize in previous years or by persons who have been members of the Jury of the Prize. The candidatures, which must include a reasoned justification and a curriculum vitae, must be presented before 31 May 2007 and should be sent to the Technical Secretariat of the Ramon Margalef Prize, Presidential Department of

the Generalitat de Catalunya. Its content may be sent beforehand by e-mail to the Prize Secretariat at prm@gencat.net or by means of the form to be found on the Prize Web site www.gencat.net/premiramonmargalef

The Prize is worth one hundred thousand euros (EUR 100,000)

The Jury, assisted with voice but not vote by the Technical Secretary of the Prize, will choose the winning candidature by majority vote. The Jury's decision is final.

7. Proclamation and presentation of the Prize

The Management Board will announce the winner of the Prize.

Presentation of the Prize will take place in Barcelona.
